HSS 1001 Introduction to Career Pathways in the Humanities and Social Sciences (1cr)

Introduction to tools and skills required to succeed in post-graduate careers in the humanities and social sciences.

POLI 2057 Introduction to International Politics (3cr) Section 4 with Dr. Mokeba, T/Th 10:30-11:50, 115 North Hall, Exclusive Section, 40 Seats.

This is a General Education course for Social Science. Basic principles, problems and concepts of international politics; evolution and nature of the nation-state; concepts of sovereignty, power and national interest; patterns of conflict and cooperation; foreign policies of the major powers.

HIST 1001 Western Civilization to 1500 (3) Section 4 with Dr. Erin Halloran, T/Th 10:30-11:50, 115 North Hall, Exclusive Section, 40 Seats.

This is a General Education Course for Humanities. The main emphasis is on Classical Greece and Rome; Christianity and its roots in Jewish religion/society; the Mediterranean after the Roman Empire; emergence of Western European states in the Middle Ages. Along with lecture presentations there are assigned readings in the textbook and primary source documents available on the course website.

CMST 2060 Public Speaking (3) Section 23 with Prof. Joni Butcher, MWF 1:30-2:30, 115 North Hall, Exclusive Section, 35 Seats.

This is a General Education Course for Humanities. Theory and skills needed by the effective communicator and critical consumer of speech; analysis of other speakers and practice in speaking.

ENGL 2024.1 Critical Strategies (3) Section with Prof. Clay Weill, T/TH 9:00-10:30, 115 North Hall, Exclusive Section, 35 Seats.

This is a General Education Course for Humanities and the English Lit requirement for PSYC majors. Skills for reading and writing about literature from a variety of critical perspectives; approaches such as reader response, psycho-analysis, myth, new historicism and feminism applied to a range of literary texts.

GEOG 2051 Physical Geography: Land and Water Surfaces, Plant and Animal Realms (3) Section 2 with Dr. S. Namikas, MWF 11:30-12:20, Shadow Section, 30 Seats.

This is a General Education Course for Natural Sciences – Physical Science. Surface elements of the earth's environment; relationships among these elements.

PHIL 1021 Introduction to Logic (3) Section 1 with Dr. Roland, T/TH 12:00-1:20, Shadow section, 10 Seats.

This is a General Education Course for Mathematics. No special background presupposed. Formal and informal reasoning; introduction to propositional logic; formal and informal fallacies; scientific reasoning.

PHIL 2020 Ethics (3) with Dr. Christopher Wells, MWF 2:30-3:20, Shadow section, 20 Seats.

This is a General Education Course for Humanities. Classical and recent theories of obligation and value, including works of philosophers such as Plato, Aristotle, Kant, Hume and Nietzsche; topics including freedom, rights, justification of moral judgments.

SOCL 2301 Introduction to Crime Studies (3) with Dr. Chantel Chauvin, MWF 10:30-11:20, Shadow Section, 20 Seats.

This is a General Education course for Social Sciences. Fundamentals of the causes, correlates, consequences, and controls of crime in society, including definitional and methodological issues.

PSYC 2040 Social Psychology (3) with Dr. Domangue, Monday *Evenings* 6-9pm, Shadow section, 30 seats.

This course counts towards the required credits to make up the PSYC degree. Cultural forces affecting attitudes, social learning, perception and communication of individuals and groups.

HNRS 2020.60 Crime and Popular Culture (3) with Prof. McCann, T/Th 1:30-2:50, Shadow Section, 5 Seats.

ONLY FOR HONORS STUDENTS. This course can count as a General Education course for either Social Science, Humanities, or English Composition. Selected themes in contemporary civilization.

HNRS 2020.61 The Politics of Punishment (3) with Prof. Gunderson, T/TH 1:30-2:50, Shadow Section, 5 Seats.
