### **HSS 1000 Introduction to Research in the Humanities and Social Sciences (1cr)**

Introduction to research topics and approaches in the humanities and social sciences. Students will be exposed to research through readings, databases and attendance at on-campus research talks. This is a mandatory class that all HSS first-years must take their first semester.

**SOCL 2001 Introductory Sociology (3cr) with Prof. Skylar Gremillion, MWF 10:30-11:20, 115 North Hall. (40 Seats)**

This is a Social Science General Education Course and a required class for all SOCL majors. Major subject areas and principles of sociology.

**POLI 2051 American Government (3cr) with Dr. Brian Hamel, TTH 12:00-1:20, 115 North Hall. (40 Seats)**

This is a Social Science General Education course and a required class for all POLI SCI majors. Principles, structures, processes and functions; emphasis on national government.

**PSYC 2000 Introduction to Psychology (3cr) with Dr. Kelly Clark, TTH 1:30-2:50, 115 North Hall. (40 Seats)**

This is a Social Science General Education course and a required class for all PSYC majors. Understanding, prediction, and control of human behavior.

**ENGL 1001 English Composition (3cr) with Instructor Nancy Foreman, TTH 9:00-10:20 & 10:30-11:50, 115 North Hall. (20 Seats each section)**

This is an English Composition General Education course and a Critical Requirement for all HSS Students. Introduction to analytical writing and research-based inquiry.

**CMST 1061 Fundamentals of Communication (3cr) with Senior Instructor Lisa Hebert, M 10:30-11:20, 115 North Hall. (40 Seats)**

This is a Humanities General Education course. The practice of rhetoric, performance studies and communication theory; extensive practical and performance applications of communication skills in addition to lectures and readings.

**GEOG 2050 Physical Geography: The Atmosphere (3cr) with Dr. Jill Trepanier, MWF 1:30-2:20, 115 North Hall. (40 Seats)**

This is a General Education course. Physical principles, processes and operations in the atmosphere; world climatic realms.

**ANTH 1003 Introduction to Cultural and Social Anthropology (3cr) TTH 1:30-2:50, E130 Howe Russell Hall.**

This is a General Education course. Diversity of human cultures; nature of culture, social organizations, subsistence patterns, economics, law, politics, religion, language and other institutions of culture viewed in cross-cultural perspective.

**HIST 2055 The United States to 1865 (3cr) with Dr. Zach Isenhower, TTH 9:00-10:20, 10 Lockett Hall**

This is a Humanities General Education Course. History of the United States from the Colonial period to the Civil War era.

**BIOL 1001 General Biology (3cr) Section 7 with Prof. Nita Bhattacharyya, MWF 12:30-1:20, 103 Williams Hall.**

This is a General Education course. For nonscience majors. General concepts in cell biology, genetics, ecology and evolution.
